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



My history with Brescia began before I was born and has been intertwined with my adult life. My mother took secretarial classes for her job at Texas Gas. Using his G.I. Bill, my Dad took organizational psychology with Father Charles Saffer. (I also had Father Saffer as a psychology professor at Brescia.) My parents would later meet & marry. While growing up I knew I wanted to go to college, but high school guidance counselors did little to help us out. My dream to go to college was assisted by Anna Katherine Therese Fraize who had been my 7-8th grade teacher, and was then teaching at Brescia and on the admissions committee. I was admitted and awarded a scholarship that covered most of my tuition. As the eldest of seven kids, I worked full time since age 16 to help support my family. This left little time to figure out a major; I changed majors three to four times in four years. I met my future husband during summer between my sophomore & junior years. We married the next summer when I was a rising senior. I graduated on time with many extra credit hours and got my first loan so I could pay my bill to graduate.

In sorting out my life, I realized I was called to be a professional helper. Fast forward to going to grad school at WKU to earn a degree in counseling while working full time. (I have true empathy for adult students.) I landed a great job

in a mental health hospital in Evansville, working in addictions treatment and psychiatric care. My specialty was offering multi-family group coun-

seling. I was tiring of the daily commute and I applied for an opening in Brescia's student support services. I didn't get that job, but I did receive a call from Sister Vivian Bowles, founder of the Counseling Center. She had been selected as President of Brescia and asked if could she forward my resume to the search committee for a counselor. Sister Ruth Gehres, the outgoing president, hired me. My job was patched together from several openings at the college: counseling services, academic advisor to 100 business majors in Weekend College, a contract providing EAP counseling for Mercy Hospital, and teaching two sections for the psychology department. The Evansville hospital accepted a twoweeks notice instead of the standard 30 days. I hit the ground running with little guidance, 48 hours before I taught my first class. (Those of you who had me as instructor in my early days, now know the backstory!)

My goal was to keep pushing myself and allowing my students to stand on my shoulders to launch their own journeys. Highlights of my Brescia life included writing the first course website using HTML, leading a student group on a learning experience in American Samoa, being selected as a family therapy specialist with a National Association for Alcoholism and Drug Abuse Counselors group doing a two week teaching exchange at psychiatric hospitals in China, earning a Fulbright Commission teaching assignment in Cyprus to work with addiction professionals and successfully writing a bi-communal grant to to the Fulbright Commission to bring 30 Greek & Turkish Cypriot medical professionals, psychologists, and social workers to Owensboro, Kentucky for three weeks of training on prevention and treatment of addictions. Amidst all this, I was blessed

to travel to China in 2000 & 2003 to adopt my wonderful daughters. I am grateful to the Brescia community that offered them a multicultural oasis in a small town. When Facebook first opened up to other colleges after the Ivy Leagues, I invited them to consider Brescia. Later, Sister Rose Jean Powers and I offered the first training on Facebook privacy settings. When I was cleaning computer files, I ran across some "interesting" photos lifted from student profiles for that presentation. I believe the majority of these folks now are pillars in their communities.

It's been a long strange trip and a beautiful life. I thought I would retire when Brescia turned 100. An injury from a fall in a local grocery resulted in 2 major shoulder surgeries in less than a year. I couldn't get the energy to fully attend to the needs of the students. My daughters now live in large, diverse cities on opposite sides of the country. I spent time with them both after retiring January 5, 2024.

I miss my students, my coworkers, my laptop, subscription to Microsoft Office, and my email address evaa@brescia.edu. ;-)

If I had made a master plan for my life, I would have sold myself short. I am extremely grateful for 40+ years of marriage, 39 1/2 years in recovery, 28 1/2 years at Brescia, and having the privilege of being Mom to my daughters and a stand in Mom for students far from home. One of my daughters earned two degrees from Brescia, one of them while in high school. The other graduated from Berea College, also an Association of Independent Kentucky Colleges and Universities institution. God had a greater plan for me than I could have envisioned and I look forward to what unfolds next. Thank you for letting me into your lives. Thank you for your trust. Best wishes to you in being the launchpad for the next generation.

BRESCIA, OWENSBORD HEALTH PARTNER FOR PEDIATRIC INITIATIVE

Owensboro Health and Brescia announced University exciting partnership at the September Greater Owensboro Chamber of Commerce Rooster Booster Breakfast today. The two organizations are collaborating on a first-of-its-kind workforce development program train healthcare workers management of pediatric patients based on the most effective therapy tools and the Adlerian Play Therapy principle.

The goal of this cooperative project is to reduce the stress and anxiety children and families experience in a healthcare setting, particularly in the emergency department. The healthcare professionals who participate in this program will be able to help pediatric patients cope through education, preparation and play more effectively. One of the tools they will use is the demonstration of all items the child may see, hear and feel before a procedure. For example, they will show them the sterile towels, let them feel the saline and that it does not burn, and let the child touch any of the items used. This is especially true for anxiety-inducing tests like a CT, when a specialist can show the patient a video of another child getting the test and explaining what to expect. This can also calm parents' worries throughout the visit.

Brescia University's Workforce Development Program Psychology faculty will train up to 10 Owensboro Health team members simultaneously with these special child-centric skills during a 10-week, 40-hour course. This professional development program is based on expansion of communication, critical thinking and life-long learning skills in practical application to the healthcare work environment. Such innovation in training allows the emergency department to provide child life services around the clock, seven days per week, while also transferring the essential skills of communication and critical thinking to other departments within the hospital.



Funding for the training is made possible through Owensboro Health Foundation.

"We are over the moon about this partnership," Tracy Naylor, foundation director, said. "The Psychology faculty, along with Dr. Anna Kuthy, Workforce Development Program Director, have worked very hard to give us an incredible offering. I am unaware of any other partnership of this kind, and I suspect it will be the first of many at Owensboro Health."

Lauren Brescia McCrary, University Executive Vice President, spoke about the partnership at the September Rooster Booster event, saying, "We are proud of our talented staff who collaboratively helped develop this initiative and our faculty who can use their welldeveloped and - researched expertise outside of the classroom in a way that impacts so many in our community. Especially exciting is the opportunity the hospital has afforded us to work

with their capable employees in this impactful way."

The program began its first cohort September 2023.



PA PROGRAM

BRESCIA UNIVERSITY TO EXAMINE DEVELOPMENT OF A MASTER'S LEVEL PHYSICIAN ASSISTANT PROGRAM

Brescia University began conducting a feasibility study more than a year ago to examine the statewide shortage of healthcare workers and work towards developing a Physician Assistant Program.* Currently, there are no Physician Assistant Programs in Western Kentucky, and only three in the state. The need for physician assistants is projected to grow by 28 percent through 2031 according to the Bureau of Labor Statistics.

This program received startup funding from Healthforce Kentucky to support the new PA program. HealthForce Kentucky is an effort to inspire careers in healthcare by providing wider access to the highest levels of instruction and technology. This unique collaboration involves nine colleges and universities along with numerous school districts across 16 counties in Western Kentucky. The shortages in healthcare professionals is a national, if not global, phenomenon that impacts the quality and availability of healthcare services. The Commonwealth of Kentucky chose to invest in an initiative to address this crisis, passing legislation to authorize funding of 38 million dollars. As part of the collaboration, the post-secondary institutions and the P-12 districts will work to share instructors and resources to provide more offerings among the districts and post-secondary institutions to expand class availability while also reducing the cost of instruction. As HealthForce Kentucky does not provide any degrees or diplomas, the collaboration with these institutions and use of shared resources is key in reaching more talented students in the 16-county footprint.

Bart Darrell, Chancellor of HealthForce Kentucky, said of the proposed program, "The proposed Physician Assistant degree program for Owensboro, Daviess County, and this region of Kentucky is a groundbreaking advancement in healthcare quality and access. HealthForce

Kentucky is proud to be part of this new healthcare career pathway. This is the first of many new collaborations in which HealthForce Kentucky will be involved as a partner with our postsecondary and P-12 education partners, along with our healthcare institutions." He continued to say, "There is an abundance of talent within our region. HealthForce Kentucky will partner on initiatives like this first ever Physician Assistant program in Owensboro, to ensure that we keep as many of our best and brightest 'at home', so that the region offers a broad range of health care with quality second to none." Darrell also mentioned, "Accessible, high quality healthcare also provides benefits to the region far beyond a healthier population. It also spurs health economic growth, civic engagement, cultural enhancement, and, quite simply, happier lives. HealthForce Kentucky congratulates all involved in this Physician Assistant initiative."

The University has hired Blair Whitaker, MPAS, PA-C, as the Program Director, and is pursuing provisional accreditation, a status granted to new PA programs, from the Accreditation Review Council for Physician Assistants (ARC-PA). Provisional accreditation lasts no less than two years and more than five years. Brescia University will be able to accept students during the provisional status.

As part of their comprehensive responsibilities, PAs conduct physical exams, diagnose and treat illnesses, order and interpret tests, counsel on preventive health care, assist in surgery, and in virtually all states can write prescriptions. Because of the close working relationship PAs have with physicians, PAs are educated in a medical model designed to complement physician training. PA students are taught, as are medical students, to diagnose and treat medical problems. PAs work in diverse medical and surgical settings, including family and internal med-

icine, emergency departments, pediatrics, obstetrics and gynecology, general surgery and surgical sub-specialties, and mental and behavioral health care.

Education consists of classroom and laboratory instruction in the basic medical and behavioral sciences (such as anatomy, pharmacology, pathophysiology, clinical medicine, and physical diagnosis), followed by clinical rotations in internal medicine, family medicine, surgery, pediatrics, obstetrics and gynecology, emergency medicine, and geriatric medicine.

Brescia University Executive Vice President, Lauren McCrary, Ed.D. said of the PA program progress, "The path to accreditation will be necessarily tough, but we are up for the challenge. We hope to get on the first available slot of the accreditors in summer 2025 and start accept-

ing students soon after the site visit. That gives us about a year and a half to get ready." McCrary also stated, "This will be such an asset to Owensboro, Western Kentucky, and the entire state as Brescia joins the efforts to make sure every Kentuckian has reliable access to healthcare."

*Brescia University Physician Assistant Program has applied for Accreditation — Provisional from the Accreditation Review Commission on Education for the Physician Assistant (ARC-PA). Brescia University Physician Assistant Program anticipates matriculating its first class in August 2026, pending achieving Accreditation — Provisional status at the March 2026 ARC-PA meeting. Accreditation — Provisional is an accreditation status granted when the plans and resource allocation, if fully implemented as planned, of a proposed program that has not yet enrolled students appear to demonstrate the program's ability to meet the ARC-PA Standards or when a program holding accreditation-provisional status appears to demonstrate continued progress in complying with the Standards as it prepares for the graduation of the first class (cohort) of students.



BRESCIA UNIVERSITY NOW OFFERS UNDERGRADUATE DEGREE IN COMMUNICATION SCIENCES AND DISORDERS ONLINE

Brescia University is excited to announce an online option for its Bachelor's in Communication Sciences and Disorders, or CSD, degree starting fall of 2024. Students will be able to complete a degree completely online, and complete practicums in their area. This program complements the University's online Master of Science in Speech-Language Pathology, or SLP, program. Graduates of the CSD program will get preferred acceptance into the SLP online program.

According to the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS), job growth for Speech-Language Pathologist is expected to rise much faster than average at 19% growth. Those with a master's degree in Speech-Language will have an advantage.

Shanda LaRue, Brescia University Executive Director of BUonline and Transfer Center, said "Brescia University is excited to play a role in providing remote pathways for students to complete their CSD degree while balancing family and work responsibilities. This pathway will also assist in filling the critical shortages in the speech language pathology field."

The online courses are eight weeks and designed with the adult student in mind. The University gladly accepts transfer credits from other regionally accredited higher-learning institutions. Students can transfer a maximum of 67 credits from a community college and a maximum of 81 from a four-year college or university.

BRESCIA UNIVERSITY AND KENTUCKY WESLEYAN COLLEGE EXPAND PARTNERSHIP OPPORTUNITIES WITH PREFERRED ACCEPTANCE IN GRADUATE PROGRAMS

Brescia University and Kentucky Wesleyan College have announced an expansion of partnership with a preferred acceptance agreement. Brescia will offer KWC bachelor degree graduates preferred acceptance into its master level programs in business administration, clinical psychology, social work and speech language pathology.

The joint announcement was made by Brescia Vice President of Academic Affairs and Academic Dean Dr. Amanda Morris and KWC Provost and Vice President of Academic Affairs Dr. James Cousins.

"We are incredibly excited to partner with Kentucky Wesleyan College and offer their graduates preferred acceptance into Brescia University's graduate programs," said Dr. Morris. "We believe this collaboration emphasizes shared values of both institutions by supporting excellent academic programs delivered with a student-centered and holistic approach. We hope this cooperation strengthens

educational opportunities within our community."

"Brescia and Kentucky Wesleyan have a long history of collaboration. Our faculty, staff, and students have partnered on everything from extracurricular programs to coordinated curriculum to travel," said Dr. Cousins. "Brescia's strengths complement our own, providing our students with unique experiences and opportunities. We're proud of this collaboration and excited to see long-term results."



Mark Perdue, Brescia University Athletic Director, said of the new team, "It is exciting to add


men's and women's bowling to our athletics programs."

We are able to accomplish this through a robust program of financial aid that not only focuses on academic merit and athletic talent but also on financial need coupled with keeping

Along with offering Pell Grants, Brescia University awards other federal, state, and institutional assistance for students based on financial need, academic merit, and talent. While in India in December for a wedding, I met with the University of Delhi Department of Social Work and the Central University of Rajasthan (CUR) Department of Social Work. Along with speaking with doctoral social work students at both universities, I was honored at the University of Delhi for serving on their advisory board for the Indian Journal of Social Work Education and Practice (https://ijswep.socialwork.du.ac.in/) and was invited to respond to a Dean's panel at CUR on India's future. As part of a research project with CUR, I met with rural villagers participating in community sustainable development projects with the Foundation for Ecological Security (FES - https://www.fes.org.in/) in Bhilwara, Rajasthan. This organization and CUR faculty work with village communities to protect and restore the integrity of the land, forest, and water resources across India.

Todd Palmer and I were invited to visit Caritas

College of Social Work, our partner institution in Owensboro's Sister City of Olomouc, Czech Republic. I was able to provide multiple lectures for students and workshops for faculty, participate in planning meetings for future partnership collaborations and exchanges with both Caritas College and Palacký University, and consult with several non-profit organizations providing services for Ukrainian refugees, a Roma community, e-gambling addiction, and women experiencing homelessness in Prague. In October, I also met with Sister City representatives from Olomouc City Hall, connected with Caritas graduates who had completed social work student internships in Owensboro through Brescia, had a private tour of the Archbishop's Palace, and attended a sacred music concert at the Klášterní Hradisko, a former Baroque monastery and currently a military hospital.
